1. Original survey 1894

Set a post, 4 ft. long, 4 ins. square, with marked stone 12 ins. in the ground, for W.C. to cor. to Sec. 3,4,9 and 10. marked with standard marks on faces and edges, dug pits 18 X 18 X 12 ins. N.E., S.E., S.W. and N.W. of post 5½ ft. dist., and raised a mound of earth 2 ft. high 4' ft. base around post.

Bunton survey 1983 set 5/8 inch diameter rebar capped G.E.B.4974S No trees available

- 2. Found plastic capped pin by G.E.B. 4974S No original evidence. Area is swampy & moose trodden. Pits and mounds have been obliterated by the forces of nature.
- 3. Since the Bunton monument is out of position and the area it is in is extremely swampy I locate a new monument approximately 30 feet further North on line between sections 3 and 4. I set a  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inch aluminum cap on a  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " X 30" aluminum pipe 28 inches in the ground from which

A spruce 5 ins. diam., bears N 38°30'W 187.1 ft. marked X BT.

A spruce 4 ins. diam., bears North 166.1 ft. marked X BT.


A steel post with location poster and land surveyor poster attached is firmly set 2 ft. north of monument.

Painted bearing trees with bright red paint and attached bearing tree and survey monument posters.

NOTE: the location for the witnessed corner was determined by splitting the discrepancy; in call location as determined from the east and south witness corners which were set from original evidence. These corners represented the closest found evidence. This location was agreed upon between Jack H. Ninneman RLS 4661S and Thomas C. Hill the supervising land surveyor for Kootenai National Forest Feb. 8, 1984.
